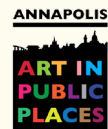
The Civil Rights Era in Maryland and Parallels of Today

BALTIMORE, MD

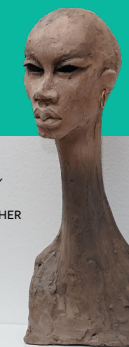
